In the early nineteenth century education for girls was limited to the reading, writing, religion, and simple arithmetic offered at the local district schools. Boys had always been allowed to attend college or become apprenticed to skilled workmen. But girls had no such opportunities until pioneer educators began to establish seminaries for young women where they could receive advanced learning. In 1831 Prudence Crandall was proud that her reputation as an outstanding teacher had prompted the male leaders of the town to select her to head a girls seminary in Canterbury, Connecticut. The residents of Canterbury were unanimous in their approval of the Female Boarding School. Prudence felt her life was progressing in a joyous upward path until the day Sarah Harris approached her. Sarah was a young black woman, so light skinned she could pass for white. Her parents were free blacks, hard working and respected in the community. Urgently, she presented her case: Miss Crandall, I want to get a little more learning, enough to teach colored children. If you will admit me to your school, I shall forever be...
