Toward the extreme headwaters of the Holokuk River, where there is no evidence of faulting, shales seem to predominate in the relatively few available exposures that adjoin the anticlinal area of the Gemuk group on Atsaksovluk Creek. Massive shales, accompanied by minor amounts of graywacke, also crop out in an anticlinal belt in a large upfaulted block along the headwater divide between Boss and Egozuk Creeks, tributaries of the Holokuk River, and Mukslulik and Bakbuk Creeks, northwestern tributaries of the Holitna River. The rocks of the basal zones of the Kuskokwim group, such as are found in the upper Holokuk River area, are massive and weather brown. In this they differ from rocks of both higher zones and of apparent lateral equivalents of the basal zones in southeastern areas. The...



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
