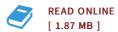




Digital Cosmopolitans: Why We Think the Internet Connects Us, Why It Doesn t, and How to Rewire It (Paperback)

In Digital Cosmopolitans Ethan Zuckerman draws on contemporary research in psychology, sociology and his own work on how humans flock together to explain why the technological ability to reach someone does not inevitably lead to increased connection.
